CELEBRATE AFRICAN-AMERICAN HISTORY & CULTURE



West Virginia has a storied legacy as a key battleground in the War Between the States, and today the Charleston area has several organizations and facilities devoted to preserving the region's African-American history and culture.

Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, CAMP WASHINGTON-CARVER was named in honor of Booker T. Washington (who spent part of his boyhood in WV) and George Washington Carver. Established in 1942 as a summer camp for African-American youth, the site is now a cultural arts center that regularly hosts the African-American Heritage Arts Camp and Appalachian String Band Festival.

HERITAGE TOWERS is Charleston's premiere African-American heritage center, offering exhibits, lectures and art programs designed to celebrate the past, present and future of black culture. The galleries take visitors on a journey from West Africa and the Underground Railroad through the Civil Rights era and the life of modern-day



coal miners, vividly bringing African-American history to life.














GREENBRIER, MEADOWS, OLD WHITE & THE SNEAD COURSES AT THE GREENBRIER

OVERVIEW: West Virginia's famed Greenbrier Resort features four distinctive courses and is ranked eighth on *Golf Digest's* list of Best Golf Resorts in North America. Built in 1913, the Old White plays host to the PGA Tour's annual Greenbrier Classic; the Greenbrier Course was redesigned in the '70s by Jack Nicklaus; the Bob Cupp-designed Meadows was awarded 4 ½ stars; and The Snead (named after longtime Greenbrier pro Sam Snead) is the centerpiece of the resort's ultra-exclusive Sporting Club.

CHARLESTON TAKES CHARGE WEST VIRGINIA'S SMALL-TOWN CAPITAL CITY OFFERS BIG-CITY ATTRACTIONS WITHOUT SACRIFICING ITS CHARM.

ADMIT IT: You already have preconceived notions of what West Virginia would be like. Chances are they involve images of mountainous terrain, hard-working miners and those quaint country roads that John Denver sang about way back in 1971. The state of West Virginia may be all of those things, but a visit to Charleston proves it's also a whole lot more.

Founded in 1794, Charleston became an important city during the pioneer era due to its remarkable natural resources, which

include coal, salt and natural gas. The Battle of Charleston and abolitionist John Brown's raid on Harpers Ferry made the territory a key battleground during the Civil War. Abraham Lincoln declared West Virginia America's 35th state in 1863, and in 1877, citizens voted for Charleston to become the state's capital. It's easy to see why. Surrounded on all sides by the rolling Appalachian hills for which the Mountaineer State is known, and split down the middle by the picturesque Kanawha River, Charleston offers a pitch-perfect balance between small-town intimacy and the amenities of a much larger city.


Charleston has experienced an explosion in cultural offerings over the past decade. The centerpiece is the Clay Center For The Arts & Sciences, a 240,000-square-foot facility opened in 2003. Named for philanthropists Buckner and Lyell Clay, the \$100 million development includes an art gallery focused on local artists, the kid-friendly Avampato Discovery Museum, the ElectricSky Theater (which features



planetarium shows and large-format films) and the Maier Foundation Performance Hall, which hosts everything from Broadway tours and the West Virginia Symphony to performances by artists such as the Chick Corea Trio (Sept. 26) and Dionne Warwick (Dec. 3).

Equally impressive is the West Virginia State Museum, which recently underwent a \$17 million renovation to upgrade the 30-year-old facility. The result is an immersive experience that takes visitors through thousands of years of West Virginia history, from the time of the Iroquois Indians and pioneers such as Daniel Boone on up to modern icons such as fighter pilot Chuck Yeager and

basketball legend Jerry West. With tours of the State Capitol Building and Governor's Mansion located right next door, you could easily spend a day here.

For those who prefer outdoor activities, the newly covered amphitheater at Haddad Riverfront Park regularly hosts outdoor "Live On The Leveee" concerts and offers boat-docking facilities along the Kanawha River, while Magic Island offers professional quality sand volleyball courts, walking paths and scenic picnic spots right where the Kanawha meets the Elk River.

If shopping is your idea of a good time, Charleston has plenty of options to choose from: Town Center Mall is one of the largest urban malls in the East; downtown's Renaissance Village offers a variety of quaint boutiques, bookstores, antique shops and chic shops at Bridge Road; the Capitol Market features an open-air section offering fresh produce and flowers as well as indoor shops selling specialty wine, meats, coffee, chocolates and more.

For a small city surrounded by so much natural beauty, Charleston offers a broad range of urban activities and excursions to entertain visitors of any stripe. But the area's greatest resource may be its people, whose refreshingly friendly attitudes make a trip down West Virginia's country roads feel like going home.

CANAAN VALLEY RESORT & CONFERENCE CENTER

Located high in the Allegheny Mountains in the heart of the Monongahela National Forest, this West Virginia State Park resort features more than 6,000 acres of land bordered by the Canaan Valley Wildlife Refuge and the Dolly Sods Wilderness Area.

Surrounded by 18 miles of trails that wind through hardwood forests, open meadows and wetlands, the resort offers abundant wildlife, guided nature walks, horseback riding and an 18-hole, par-72 golf course, ensuring that even non-skiers and off-season visitors can have a great time. Other amenities include geocaching games, a climbing wall, paintball and an outdoor pool during summer months.

During ski season, which typically begins around mid-December, the state's first commercial ski development attracts a diverse crowd thanks to the breadth of its offerings, which include ski slopes, snowboarding parks, a tubing park and an ice-skating rink. Other than the beginner skiing area and a long green trail running from the summit to the resort base, most of the mountain's terrain is marked either "More Difficult" or "Most Difficult," providing solid challenges for experienced skiers. The resort also offers night skiing every Thursday through Sunday during peak season and on holidays.

SNOWSHOE MOUNTAIN

Ranked the No. 1 ski resort in the mid-Atlantic and Southeast region by Skiing magazine in 2009, Snowshoe sits on 11,000 acres of pristine woodland in the Allegheny Mountains and is the second highest point in West Virginia.

Snowshoe Mountain is the name of the resort, but it actually sits on top of Cheat Mountain, right at the head of the Shavers Fork of the Cheat River. Snowshoe's elevation, cool temperatures, stunning views and four-season outdoor recreation opportunities attract nearly 500,000 visitors each year.

The expansive resort offers year-round activities such as mountain biking, horseback riding, fly fishing, climbing walls, canoeing and kayaking, hiking, clay shooting, ATV and Segway tours and the alwayspopular Raven Golf Club, which has been named one of the Top 30 resort courses in America. But it's in winter that Snowshoe really shines, offering 60 different slopes and trails (41% easier, 36% more difficult, 23% most difficult), a lift capacity of 23,400 people per hour, 12 slopes open for night skiing, and both group and private lessons in skiing and snowboarding.





WILD, WONDERFUL WEST VIRGINIA OUTDOOR ADVENTURES IN THE MOUNTAIN STATE

West Virginians often refer to their state as "Almost Heaven" (borrowed from a line in the John Denver song "Take Me Home, Country Roads"), and you don't even have to step foot on their native ground to understand why. Flying into Charleston's Yeager Airport, you'll find yourself amazed by sprawling views of the Mountain State's dynamic terrain, approximately 75% of which is within the Cumberland Plateau and Allegheny Plateau regions. Sparse in population but rich in biodiversity and scenic beauty, West Virginia is a wild and wonderful paradise for nature lovers, offering endless options for outdoor adventures.













ATV BACKCOUNTRY TOURS

One of the best ways to explore West Virginia's rugged, rustic rural areas, All Terrain Vehicle Tours such as the ones offered by Ace Adventure Resort take you deep into the heart of the New River Gorge backcountry. Featured on the Travel Channel's "Extreme Resorts" as North America's Largest Adventure Resort, ACE encompasses 1500 acres of pristine wilderness, with nearly 30 miles of trails for you to explore. After a brief 30-minute safety demonstration and a quick spin to get a feel for the fine points of operating their Can Am 400 Tandem ATVs, you're off into the woods, zooming between thick undergrowth, over hills, and splashing through puddles while viewing spectacular scenery (including an amazing view overlooking the New River). Their guides will explain the history of the area, from the village that perched right on the mountaintop in the 1800s to the once-bustling mining town below that took on a Wild Westlike reputation. At the end of the 3-hour trek (two of which are spent riding), you'll be thankful for a cool, refreshing dip in the resort's lake to wash off the mud!

Southern West Virginia offers hundreds of miles of off-road trails and adventures that range from challenging to leisurely. The award-winning Hatfield-McCoy Trails is one of the largest off-road vehicle trail systems in the world with 500 miles to traverse. Many trails even connect to ATV-friendly, charming small towns where visitors can shop and eat. With six unique trails, the Hatfield-McCoy system truly has something for everyone to enjoy. ATV rentals and dealers are available along the trail, as well as lodging that include resorts, hotels, bed and breakfasts, cabins and camping sites. National media outlets like ATV Illustrated, ATV Sport, Dirt Rider and ATV Magazine as well as television programs on Outdoor Channel have praised the trail system. In fact, people often say, "Since West Virginia is known as 'Almost Heaven,' it's only natural the Hatfield-McCoy Trails have become known as 'Trails Heaven.'"


CANOPY TOURS

If you've never experienced the extreme adrenaline rush of a zipline before, the **TreeTops New River Gorge Canopy Tour** is an invigorating adventure that should not be missed. While ziplines themselves are inherently exhilarating, it's the spectacular scenery that makes this one special. After strapping into your harnesses and helmet, guides lead guests through orientation and allow them to practice on a "Ground School" zip located just a few feet off the ground. After that you make a short hike up to the relative tame Ajax Zip, the first in a series of ten zips varying in length from 100 to 730 feet, with speeds approaching up to 30 miles per hour. The 3.5-hour course (which also includes five sky bridges,

three short hikes and a 40-foot rappel down from the final platform) is wisely designed to ease first-timers into it, with the zips increasing in intensity as your gain confidence. By the end, you'll be screaming "Bonzai!" at the top of your lungs as you whirr through lush rhododendron and old-growth Eastern Hemlock and over pastoral Mill Creek (which is also known for excellent trout fishing). Think of it as communing with nature at a heart-pumping pace.

WHITEWATER RAFTING

With its scenic wilderness and wild rivers, West Virginia has emerged as one of the nation's premiere whitewater rafting destinations. There are more than a dozen major rafting outfitters to choose from, but **Class VI- Mountain River** is among the most trusted, with over 35 years of experience in guiding guests down both the New River and the Gauley River. They offer a broad variety of tours to suit varying ages, experience and interest levels, ranging from quick two-hour treks to three-day adventures that include overnight camping. For families with small children ages six and up, the Upper New River offers a laid-back float trip, while Lower New River is rated for ages 12 and up, offering rushing rapids and a steep lower gorge canyon. For those seeking a more intense rafting challenge, the Lower Gauley River kicks it up a notch with its intense Class IV-V rapids, with a few placid pools in between to catch your breath. You might find yourself holding that breath if you dare to take on the Upper Gauley, which offers a serious series of Class V challenges stacked one on top of the other. It's definitely not for the faint of heart... or the weak of arm.
